

Junior Checklist



FALL

- Take a strong course load and do your best to make good grades.**
One day a college admissions officer will actually look at your transcript (your courses and grades) and make a decision on your work ethic based on your grades, focusing initially on 9th-11th grade. (Plus, the better grades you have, the more upper level courses you will be eligible to take in the future.)
- Prayerfully start making a list of colleges and universities you may be interested in attending.** Begin to research schools and programs that will meet your educational needs. Consider what careers you may want to pursue, and discover what path you will need to follow to reach your goals.
- Setup an appointment to meet with your guidance coordinator to review your current transcript and plans!**
Continue to look for areas that need improvement, establish a plan going forward whether towards a college or career.
- Frequently monitor the guidance page of the school website.**
This is your one stop shop for commonly requested forms and is the place to go to keep informed of any upcoming college visits and other college and career planning events.
- Attend a Christian and Public School College Fair.**
- Try something new – different from last year!** Try a new club, organization or sport.
Many colleges and organizations look for the well-rounded student.
- Continue volunteering for community service hours.**
Keep in mind that in-depth involvement is best. While four or five hours here and there are better than nothing, look for volunteer activities where you may want to make a long-term commitment, preferably even gaining experience in an area you may be interested in pursuing as a career. - Review Your College Board <https://www.collegeboard.org/> and ACT Profile www.actprofile.org accounts.**
Review your information to ensure it is up-to-date with your latest information, goals, and interests.
- Maintain your high school resume.**

- Continue looking up scholarship opportunities.**

- Prepare for the PSAT.**
Go to your College Board account to practice critical reading, math, and writing skills questions.
- Take the PSAT in class.**

- Signup, practice and take the ACT (if needed)**
Go to www.act.org to signup and practice critical reading, math, science and writing skills questions.

SPRING

- Continue to work hard on your grades.**
Proactive preparation today will avoid last minute reactive panic. If you find that you are struggling in any of your classes, please ask your teacher for help. If that is not enough, see your guidance coordinator for information on tutoring.
- Continue your activities and community service work.**
- Signup, practice and take the SAT (if needed)**
Go to your college board account to signup and practice critical reading, math, science and writing skills questions.
- If you are an athlete:** Register with the NCAA web3.ncaa.org/ecwr3/ and NAIA www.playnaia.org clearinghouses. After you have finished the sport your junior year, you can begin the recruiting process. Meet with your coach and the Athletics Director about your intentions.
Go to your college board account to signup and practice critical reading, math, science and writing skills questions.
- Choose your 12th grade courses wisely.**
Consider if Dual-Enrollment is an option for you. Meet with the guidance coordinator to see if you are eligible and visit www.palmbeachstate.edu to learn more. It is extremely important that you maintain a challenging schedule if you plan to attend a competitive college.
- Take a spring break or summer college visit.** Remember to create a list of questions to ask while visiting.
